

### Short note on teaching load for academic staff (prepared for the Evaluation Panel)

The purpose of this short note on teaching load is to give an overview of the "normal" and "formal" teaching load for a fulltime assistant-, associate- and full professor. Here "normal" means staff-members without special assignments as for instance a study director with reductions in teaching load. "Formal" in quotation marks indicates, that in reality the formal counting of hours often is reflected differently at the individual level depending on type of course, teaching experience, students, exams, project type, etc. In reality, many teach, supervise and/or use more time for preparation than may be registered via the formal norms.

## Overall teaching load for full time staff

According to the collective agreement, full time work load for academic staff is 1640 hours pr. year or 820 hours per semester. In the following the point of departure is one semester (820 hours).

At the Social Science Faculty allocation of the 820 hours per semester is split between research and teaching activities in the following way:

Assistant professor	50/50 meaning 410 hours for teaching and 410 hours for research
	activities
Associate professor	60/40 meaning 492 hours for teaching and 328 hours for research
and full professor	activities
PhD-students	General rule is 600 hours of teaching in total over a 3 years period.

In principle, all research related activities (writing papers, reviewing, participating in conferences, research meetings, seminars, applying for funding, collaboration with external partner, third mission activities, registration of activities, etc.) are expected to be included in the 328 (410) hours formally allocated for research.

Similarly, all teaching related activities (lecturing, preparing, planning meetings, meetings with students, exams, revising courses and syllabus, upgrading of pedagogical skills, etc.) are expected to be included in the 492 (410) hours formally allocated for teaching.

It is possible to have for instance a higher (above 492 hours) teaching load in the autumn semester and a lover (below 492) in the spring semester. It is also possible to accumulate hours in an "hour bank" and convert these to reduced teaching load later or to research assistance or other research supporting activities. Only in rare cases, hours from the 'hour bank' can be paid out as extra salary.

It is possible (after negotiation with the Head of Department) to use external funding to "buy one out" from teaching (meaning reducing the teaching load) equivalent to the amount of external funding.

## General norms for direct teaching (classes) and supervision of student projects

Some variations exist between study programmes, type of courses, number of students, but for the bachelors- and master degree programmes these are smaller adjustments to the general norms. Assistant professors and PhD-students have a slightly better norm for class lecturing than associate and full professors. Teaching on part time diploma programmes and the MBA programme implies other norms not listed here.

- A 5 ECTS course will typically mean 8-10 lectures in class.
- A 10 ECTS course will typically mean 10-12 lectures in class plus various types of student assignments (for instance an essay)

## Activities reducing the direct teaching load

At the Social Science Faculty, the direct teaching load is reduced according to specific norms if a staff member takes on various other typical tasks. Below are some examples (the list is not a complete list):

- Main Ph.D.-supervisor: 50 hours per semester in three years. Often there are both a main and a second supervisor. Then the 50 hours are shared between the two supervisors (2\*25 hours)
- Ph.D.-course: depends on format and responsibility
- Chairman of a Ph.D.-assessment committee: 32 hours
- Participation in university pedagogical course for assistant professors: 2\*63 hours
- Member of Academic Council, Member of Department Council: 40 hours per year


